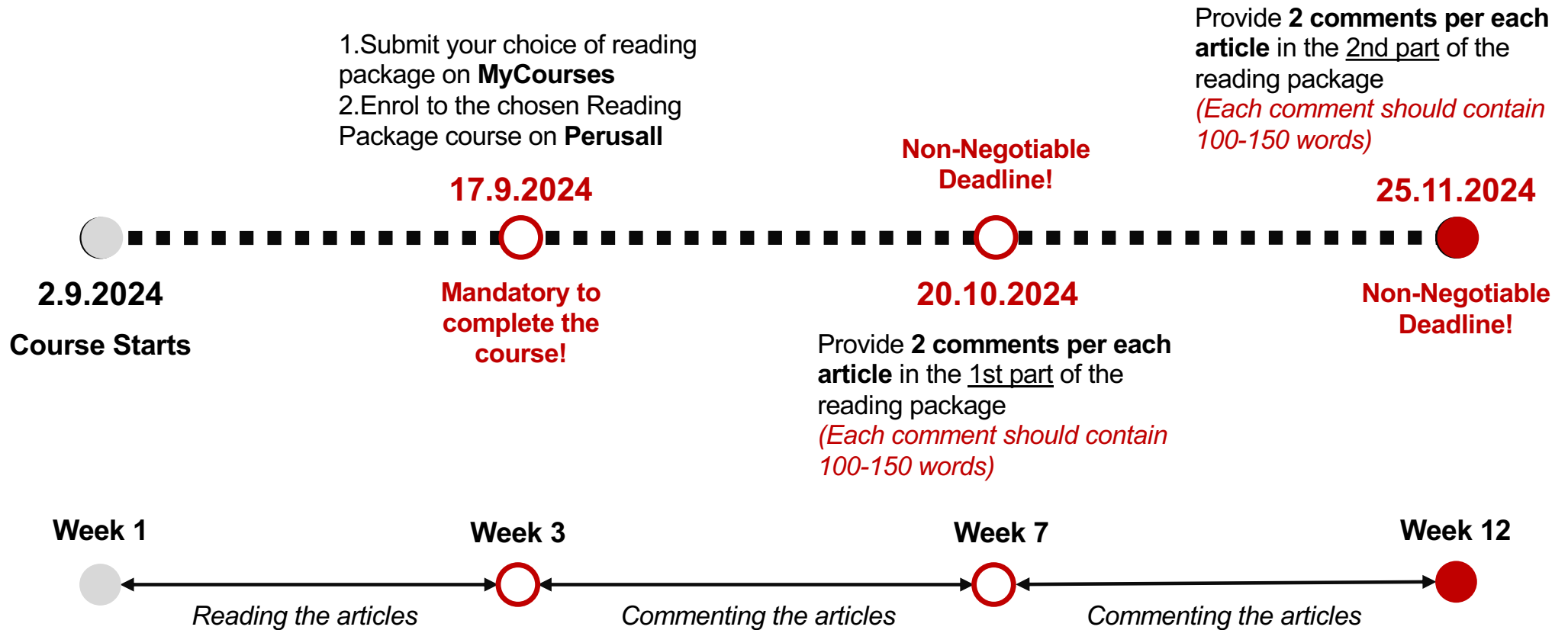
MyCourses page is used to perform the following tasks:

Deadlines and requirements

There will be **no concessions** to any of the deadlines for any reasons:

- If you fail to choose your topic by the deadline, you cannot have your work graded
- If you fail to provide comments for the articles before the deadlines, these comments will not be graded

Doble-check your **enrollment information** on Sisu:

Deliverable: thematic comments

Each thematic Reading package consists of:

- **15-17** articles – for bachelor's level
- **20** articles – for master's level

After reading the articles, the students will provide thematic comments about primary themes outlined in the articles:

- The work will be divided in two parts: 1) commenting on the **1st part** of the reading package; 2) commenting on the **2nd part** of the reading package
- The task is to provide **at least 2 comments** to **each article** within the package: you can both provide individual comments, and respond to other students' comments

Tip: commenting on other students' thoughts can be very beneficial, as it helps you, for example, provide critique while writing comments

- Each comment should contain about **100-150 words**

Tip: feel free to first use text editors that can calculate the number of words (e.g. MS Word)

- Students can and should refer to other articles within the reading package – in this case only **in-text references** should be provided

Tips to construct a good comment

Make sure you have time to read and write!

Tips for good comment writing:

- Take constant notes on the readings, summarize their main points to yourself
- Compare and contrast the readings, identify themes that connect some or all of them
- Identify inconsistencies, differences, ambiguity, and problems between readings
- Refer to other articles within the package & comment on other students' thoughts – it can help you provide more analysis and critique, as well as argue your point
- Develop an objective or “viewpoint” for the comment - what do you want to convince the reader about?
- While outlining your comment, think what supportive and counter-arguments you must present to argue your viewpoint
- Proofread, edit, and rewrite the comment, if necessary

Tips to construct a good comment

Some DOs and DON'Ts:

- Do not present a **mere chronological summary** of the content of the article(s)
- Do not just **present various themes within the articles** – identify meaningful connections, compare and contrast the themes across one and even different articles
- Remember: your comment should never be **vague, combative or confrontational**. You should try to provide a definable, arguable claim, as you want to convince the reader and initiate a meaningful dialogue
- “Critical reflection” does not mean **vague declarations of “I like/I do not like/agree with...”**. Remember to specify your claims and present clear arguments through the use of evidence
- Do not submit a **“wall of text”** – make sure that your arguments are clearly structured and form a coherent whole

Common pitfalls and errors

Use the references:

- If in your comment to one article you refer to other articles in the package, you need to use in-text references/citations
- Use consistent referencing style throughout your comments

Take time to edit and re-read and repeat it:

- Helps avoid minor and easily fixable mistakes

Critical analysis and reflection:

- Often we receive a great summary of the article(s) but without much critical engagement or reflection about the text (particularly important for students taking the master's course)

Comment about something that interests you:

- Helps in nearly all areas and gives the comment a more focused narrative
- You can pick an phenomena, event, company etc., that relates to your chosen topic to comment about

Instructions for providing thematic comments in Perusall

Enrolment and working on the assignments

1. Go to <https://www.perusall.com>, click “**Login**”, then “**Register**”, and create an account with your real name & surname and Aalto email address.
2. Choose the option “**I am a student**”, join the course by clicking “**Enter enrollment code**” and by entering the **code** provided at the MyCourses page that corresponds to your Reading Package.
3. You can review the readings in the “**Library**” tab, and the assignments and deadlines in the “**Assignments**” tab. In order to start commenting on the articles, enter the “**Assignments**”, select the assignment, and click “**Work on assignment**”.
5. To provide a new comment click one of the toolbar buttons in the upper panel: “**Annotate text**” or “**Annotate figure**” in the upper panel of the page, highlight the text or part of the article you want to comment on and enter the comment in the panel “**Current conversation**” on the right. Press Enter or “**Submit**” for the comment to be submitted.

Tip: The “**Annotate text**” mode allows you to highlight the part of the text you want to comment on, but some documents will not allow you to highlight the text – use the “**Annotate figure**” mode to manually highlight a part of the article in this case.

Tip: If you do not want to comment on specific part of the text, but on article in general – you can highlight any place on the first page of the article.

6. To reply to other students’ comments or on the same part of the text, click on the highlighted text or part of the article that was commented, and enter the comment in the panel “**Current conversation**” on the right. If you are replying to other student’s comment, you can mention a person by typing @. Press Enter or “**Submit**” for the comment to be submitted.

Grading

Grading algorithm

Grading is performed using the following algorithm:

- Preliminary grade for every comment is suggested by **Perusal automatic scoring system** based on quality defined by machine learning algorithm
- If needed, every grade is **adjusted** by the course instructors based on the **grading rubric**
- All the scores obtained by a student are **averaged** for the final course grade

Tip: you can provide more than the mandatory number of comments, but the total grade will be averaged in the end

Every comment is evaluated with the following scale:

- **Low-quality:** corresponds to **0** in the grading rubric
- **Medium-quality:** corresponds to **3** in the grading rubric
- **High-quality:** corresponds to **5** in the grading rubric

! Please, do not provide any comments except for ones that are going to be graded, as the system will not distinguish them from the quality ones !

For example, do not leave comments like “sure”, “thank you for pointing it out”, etc. If you want to react to the other students’ comments – just use the “thumbs up” tool in Perusal (see the instructions for the use of Perusal on MyCourses)

When scores are available, the student could see them by clicking “My scores” button on the course home page in Perusal
