INTRODUCTION TO FINNISH LANGUAGE

- Finnish is a member of the Finno-Ugric family of languages
 - That's why it differs from Indo-European languages (structure and vocabulary)
- No articles:
 - bussi: a/the bus
 - tomaatti: a/the tomato
- No grammatical gender
 - Even the pronoun hän: he/she is the same for both sexes
- No future form
 - Menen töihin huomenna: I'll go to work tomorrow.
- Written and spoken language differs quite a lot
 - Voitko tulla minun luokseen? -> Voiksä tulla mun luo?: Can you come to my place?

AGGLUTINATIVE LANGUAGE

- Finnish has endings and suffixes instead of prepositions and other individual words
 - 15 grammatical cases
 - bussi+ssa: in the bus
 - puhu+t+ko?: do you speak?
- Finnish also has postpositions that are used the same way as English prepositions: most of them are put after the word
 - Liisan kanssa: with Liisa

PRONUNCIATION AND SPELLING

- Phonetic language
 - Each written letter is represented by the same sound and each sound is written with the same letter
- There are long and short sounds and letters in Finnish
 - Keep them separate because otherwise your message might change:
 - Minä tapaan Maijan: I'll meet Maija.
 - Minä tapan Maijan: I'll kill Maija.
- The main stress of the word is on the first syllable
- Sentence intonation falls off
 - Intonation doesn't rise even in questions. The question has either a question pronoun or the question suffix.
 - Mikä sinun nimi on? What's your name?
 - Onko sinun nimi Matti? Is your name Matti?
 - Lähdetkö oluelle? Would you like to go for a beer?

VOWELS

- There are 8 vowels in Finnish language
 - all of them can be short or long
- Lots of vowel combinations and diphthongs
 - they must all be uttered
- Vowel harmony
 - When a word has vowels a, u, o, ending has a, o or u as well
 - **autossa, lattia-lla** BUT: **pöydä-llä**
 - except of compound words: **jääkaapissa:** in the fridge

CONSONANTS

K, p, t, l, m, n, r and s can be either short or long, others just short. For example:

- k, kk: kuka - kukka: who - flower
- l, ll: tuli - tulli: fire - customs
- r, rr: meri - herra: sea - mister
- t, tt: sata - vuotta: hundred - years
- p, pp: papu - soppa: bean - soup

VOCABULARY

- Finnish origin vocabulary
 - kirja: a/the book
 - tietokone: a/the computer
 - sähkö: electricity
- Forming new words
 - Endings:
 - kirja -> kirjasto (a/the library)
 - kahvi (coffee) -> kahvila (coffee house)
 - Compound words:
 - tieto + kone = tietokone: knowledge + machine
 - tikkukaramelli/tikkari (lollipop): a stick + candy
- Loanwords
 - banaani, tomaatti, baari...



INTRODUCING ONESELF

- Hei! / Moi!
- Minä olen Nelli. / Mä oon Nelli. (I am ...)
 - OR: Minun nimi on Nelli. / Mun nimi on Nelli. (My name is....)
- Kuka sinä olet? / Kuka sä oot? (Who are you?)
- Hauska tutustua! (Nice to meet you!)
- Hei hei! / Moi moi! / Moikka!

GREETINGS

- (Hyvää) Huomenta!



- (Hyvää) Päivää!



- (Hyvää) Iltaa!



- Hyvää yönä!
