Mary-Louise Pratt: [sites where]

"cultures, meet, clash and grapple with each other, often in contexts of highly asymmetrical relations of power, such as colonialism, slavery, or their aftermaths as they are lived out in many parts of the world today".

Donna Haraway: in where species meet also refers to interspecies contact zones/ecological intersections which she also calls ecotones "edge effects [...] where assemblages of biological species form outside their comfort zones" This can refer to, for example border zones between one ecological system and another, or describe ways that native and 'non-native' species constitute each other or between dominant and marginal beings,

#### You will be asked to:

#### (By end January 2021)

Formulate an (of course preliminary) research question that engages in some way the natural, cultural human and more than human complexities\* of a specific aspect of Vuosaari you are interested in (some examples of these are in the research assignment PDF)

#### (By mid February 2021)

Find your group.
(for this class I will also accept that you work in pairs)

\*By **complexity**, I want you to think about, for example, how an ecological inquiry intersects with, impacts or sheds light upon another lens with which to regard this site; this could be an economic, a historic, a social lens. Or it could be a lens pertaining to some question of social justice.

#### You will be asked to:


### (Month of February 2021)

Develop an experimental method of responding to your research question/s via your practice/the combination of practices in your group and the knowledge you glean from the fields in which your question intersects

## (Month of March 2021)

**Produce a creative response**; this could be a finished work, (audio tour, experimental map or game,, short film, performance, animation, children's book, graphic narrative, bio-artwork...)

Or it could be a detailed prototype for a creative response to this question which harnesses the particular methods of engagement you have developed.






## Exercises & Site Research Explorations


These may take many forms. I will suggest some, you may have others but in the course of researching your project. I will have liked you to:

- 3. Have made research inquiries at the library/Helsinki archives/newspaper archives
- 4. Have talked to some residents
- 5. Have made headway into researching the specific disciplinary knowledge(s) you need to loan from for your project:

eg photosynthesis, urban planning histories, sea water composition, industrial development, decomposition, aural frequencies heard by bats, bee hibernation in urban spaces, forest fungal networks, community garden ecologies, invasive species, microbes on shopping mall escalators gender/race/class/age/sexuality barriers +++

## Exercises & Site Research Explorations

First day of getting to know things. Its cold out there. Stay together, stay safe. Don't stay out too long, retreat to a warm place to regroup. Make sure you bring a change of clothes.

## 1. Psychogeographical Investigations in "Parkland" Outdoors: Dérive in a particular beach or nature reserve site

Walk 1 Dérive by Flocking (20 min): Just drift/just flock in silence getting lost in order to experience things differently for this flocking exercise shared with me by bio artist Kira O'Reilly. In this exercise, you explore a space while acting like birds or a herd: One person takes the lead and then another, who this is is never decided verbally, it is implicitly decided by the group. You are allowed to gesticulate and point, but you do not talk. See how and whether your group becomes an organism and how this group interacts with the energies and ecologies around you.

What are the main immediate human and non human, energies at work when you go outside? Where do they come from, where do they push you? How do they impact you, how are they impacting other species around you?

What are particular "hotspots" concentrations of energy can you notice. What are the main sounds, where do these sounds lead you?

Where do you discover blockages, boundaries barriers, visible and invisible

Return to base and discuss.

Try to map these out on a piece of paper. What questions have arisen from this walk?

2 Psychogeographical Investigations in Urban Outdoors: exploring an particular urban site (20 min walk, 20 min discussion. Return to talk with Lucy in one hour)

Repeat walk 1 but in an urban environment

3. Psychogeographical Investigations Indoors: exploring an indoor urban public site (wear a mask, be safe! 20 min walk, 20 min discussion. Return to talk with Lucy in one hour)

Repeat walk 1 or something like it but in an indoor environment
