


Lee Kee Boon Building *Nanyang University* 1955 National University of Singapore Museum Collection

Attempt to recast form and spirit of the mid 20th century, Malayan modern woodcut movement in a contemporary macroecological context of "cutting wood" (regional deforestation).

Use of anecdotes, thick descriptions as an attempt to write with wood, to make the writing evocative of trees, forests and wood.

Woodprint collage medium is not there to illustrate science, rather it is a story telling method in which individual fragments of prints are active partners.



A Research Question of

sorts:

How might my research draw out a dream in DNA code that has seeded itself; like teak once did across an archipelago?

How might I trace of such a process as finger prints meet wood grain through a wooden materiality?

How might such tracings reveal interconnected, mutable but nonetheless grounded ecologies of power, economics, labour, gender, species and spirits?
















Current writing Projects 1) Story-telling Like Shadows Through Leaves
