



WHAT IS PHILOSOPHY?

- Art or science? Both?
- Trying to get answers to things that cannot be explained
- It's kind of science, but used to having a correct answer
- Thinking about something, analyzing something, asking the right questions
- Study of knowledge
- Ethics? Is it a part of philosophy?
- How can you figure out right or wrong?
- Words have many meanings -> "philosophical person" is synonym for someone who thinks outside the box
- A way to seek answers without answering anything
- Finding your own truths
- Not about finding the complete answer
- Fact based vs opinion based
- Thinking about things that we usually just accept
- Descartes: I think, therefore I am
- Meaning -> how do we define if anything has meaning, why do we do this?
