Visualisations are succinct and of good quality. Language is nearly faultless, and communicates in an economical manner the key points.	Excellent (21-30)= Narrative production is convincing and inspires action. The structure and the story make sense, and the argumentation is solid, putting forward a new way of looking at something (a concept, situation, people). There might be some faults or omissions in the work, but they do not cause confusion. Visuals are of good quality and critical parts of the narrative. The theory of change is discussed economically and has clear connection with the narrative and its objects.

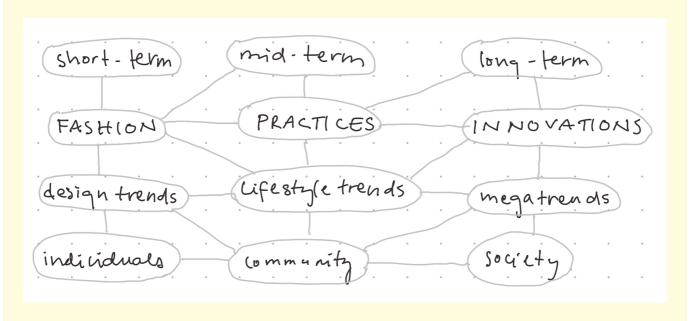
