## Environmental Aesthetics: Background

- Tradition since antiquity to think about natural beauty and the relation with nature that human beings have
  - Articulated in different ways during different times
- Aesthetic qualities e.g. beautiful, sublime, picturesque
- Environmental aesthetics in its present form since 1960s (Ronald Hepburn)
  - Descriptive: "How do we appreciate nature?"
  - Normative: "How should we appreciate nature?"






This classic photograph of the Earth was taken on December 7, 1972. The original caption is reprinted below:

View of the Earth as seen by the Apollo 17 crew traveling toward the moon. This translunar coast photograph extends from the Mediterranean Sea area to the Antarctica south polar ice cap. This is the first time the Apollo trajectory made it possible to photograph the south polar ice cap. Note the heavy cloud cover in the Southern Hemisphere. Almost the entire coastline of Africa is clearly visible. The Arabian Peninsula can be seen at the northeastern edge of Africa. The large island off the coast of Africa is the Malagasy Republic. The Asian mainland is on the horizon toward the northeast.

One of the most widely known photographs of Earth, this image was taken by the crew of the final Apollo mission as the crew made its way to the Moon. Dubbed the "Blue Marble," Earth is revealed as both a vast planet home to billions of creatures and a beautiful orb capable of fitting into the pocket of the universe.



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

## What is studied? Concept of the Environment 1/2

- Natural environment
  - The beginning of EA as natural aesthetics
- Built environment (urban)
  - Urban aesthetics (1990s ->)
- Human environment (urban+rural+natural+?)
  - Human beings as part of the environment (anthropocene)
  - E.g. urban nature understood as a new hybrid form

# What is studied? Concept of the Environment 2/2

- Aesthetic values
  - Criteria for evaluation
  - Relation of aesthetic values to other values such as ethical, ecological etc.
- Different contexts
  - Specific environments, defined by e.g. objects, activity or users
- Environmental art
  - How does art reflect the relation between humans and their environment?

## How is it studied? – Approaches 1/3

### Cognitive theories

- Aesthetic value is formed purely based on the properties of the object of appreciation: strives to be an OBJECTIVE theory
- Normative approach: what is the RIGHT way to judge/appreciate environment
- (Natural) science gives the right categories for aesthetic appreciation of nature
- Knowledge is needed in order to UNDERSTAND the aesthetic value (background in the philosophy of art)
- Attempts to "save nature" from random subjective judgment, to value nature "on its own terms"
- Extreme form: so-called Positive Aesthetics

## How is it studied? – Approaches 2/3


## Non-cognitive theories

- Takes into consideration the subjective elements in appreciating environment
- Aesthetic judgment is based on human abilities, e.g. imagination, emotional arousal
- Attempts to balance cognitive approaches: aesthetic values as separate from ethical values (without disparaging them)
- "The mystery model"

You've Been Trumped is a 2011 documentary by British filmmaker Anthony Baxter. The film documents the construction of a luxury golf course on a beach in Balmedie, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, by developer Donald Trump, and the subsequent struggles between the locals and Donald Trump and Scottish legal and governmental authorities.

When it was announced that the documentary was to be given its British television premiere on BBC Two on 21 October 2012, Trump's lawyers contacted the corporation to demand that the film should not be shown, claiming that it is "defamatory" and "misleading". The screening went ahead. The BBC defended its decision, noting that Trump had repeatedly refused to be interviewed in conjunction with the film.<sup>[2]</sup>

In October 2016, filmmaker Anthony Baxter announced the release of *You've Been Trumped Too*, a sequel to the film timed for release before the United States presidential election, 2016.<sup>[3]</sup>



#### **PREVIEW**

As one of the most mundane aspects of daily life, laundry rarely garners aesthetic attention. However, this practical chore turns out to contain numerous aesthetic considerations beyond ensuring hygiene and cleanliness. Furthermore, the aesthetics of laundry is not limited to the sensuous appearance of the laundered items. The activity of laundering also has aesthetic dimensions, including bodily engagement, imaginative camaraderie with women across cultural and historical boundaries, satisfaction with the tangible expression of love for the family, and appreciation of the outdoor environment when hanging laundry. Finally, the consequences of the aesthetics of laundry extend beyond personal experiences. Namely, the appearance of clothing is often regarded as a reflection of one's moral character, and the 'eyesore' effect of outdoor laundry hanging leads to its prohibition in some communities in the United States.

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## How to study? — Approaches 3/3


- Aesthetic experience as interaction
- Moving away from the "landscape model", in which nature is studied from a distance
- Aesthetic engagement (Arnold Berleant)
  - Participation, engagement, interaction with the environment
  - Sensory information & experience (e.g. Richard Shusterman's somaesthetics)
  - Lived relationship with the environment, formed through the body
  - Viewing the environment as a seamless unity of places, organisms, and perceptions (against dichotomies)


Nature-human relation, as in e.g. studying ecosystem services
