Linear-active


Calm, factual, straightforward, direct



Other trends in expenditure (proportional)

Household expenditure by consumption purpose (Eurostat 2016)

- Finns rank high: Housing, water, fuels (no. 1), recreation and culture (no. 3)
- Finns rank low (below average): education, restaurants & hotels

Analysis: happiness and suicides

Happiness correlates with:

- Social inclusion
- Economical, social, physical and experienced safety
- Equality
- Health

Social and communicative pratices in Finland:

- Do not differentiate as long as you are;
- socially accepted
- economically (etc.) stable

Social, economical, physical and psychological problems:

- Trusted to governmental instances
- Lack of informal vocabulary and social tools
